

Seven Things about Epiphany

1. The word means "manifestation". It comes from Greek roots meaning "to show, to display" and "on, to". Epiphany is thus a time when something is shown, displayed, or manifested to an audience.

- 2. The Epiphany is the manifestation of Jesus as Messiah of Israel, Son of God and Saviour of the world. This feast celebrates the adoration of Jesus by the wise men (magi) from the East, together with his baptism in the Jordan and the wedding feast at Cana in Galilee.
- 3. When it is celebrated varies from country to country. In some countries, Epiphany is a Holy Day of obligation and is celebrated on January 6. In the United States it is celebrated the first Sunday in after January 1, and is not a Holy Day of obligation.
- 4. It is hard to say how far back the beginnings of the Christmas feast go. It assumed its definitive form in the third century. The feast of the Epiphany emerged in the East on January 6, and the feast of Christmas in the West on December 25. Although the feasts have different emphases, their essential meaning was the same: the celebration of the birth of Christ as the dawning of the new light and true Son.
- 5. The Magi was understood to be members of the Persian priestly caste. They are also considered to have the following" possessors and users of supernatural knowledge and ability, magicians, and finally deceivers and seducers. For the Magi in Matthew 2, it is our first of the four meanings which apply, at least in a broad sense.
- 6. The Magi were of a prophetic nature which allowed them to identify the birth of the new "king of the Jews" astronomically. They may have been motivated to see this king of the Jews since there was an expectation at the time that a universal ruler would shortly come from Israel.
- 7. The Magi went to Herod as they assumed the newborn king with be a son of Herod—the current "king of the Jews". Upon finding out this was false, they played into Herod's paranoia for his throne and led to the slaughter of the innocents.

Everyday Stewardship

"The Story of the Other Wise Man" by Henry Van Dyke was first published in 1895. It tells the fictional story of Artaban, a fourth wise man who began a jour-

ney to visit Jesus, the newborn King. Unlike his fellow Magi, he failed to make it there for the birth of Jesus because he kept pausing to help various people in need. In fact, it took him about 33 years of searching before his quest comes to an abrupt end when he is hit in the head with a falling roof shingle. His final breath takes place in Jerusalem near the place where Jesus is being crucified. As he lies dying, he hears the voice of Jesus telling him that the gifts he has given all along the way to "the least of these" he has actually given to Jesus himself.

If you have never read this story or seen the made-fortelevision movie based on the tale, you really should seek it out. It is a story that reminds us of a profound truth: Jesus himself rests in the lives of all those around us in need. In the story, it was the wise man's constant response to a stewardship call that prevented him from getting where he wanted to go. In the end, where he needed to go was more significant than where he thought he should go.

If we live lives of generosity and graciousness, we may find ourselves on constant detours from the road on which we are traveling. It is in the detours and the unexpected circumstances of our journey that often times we find our true purpose in life. We think God is somewhere we must travel to, when in reality, God is closer than we think in the least likely of places.
