Many of our athletes are morally good men and women. They contribute to charities and reach out to the youth. We can always ask, are we doing enough and are our priorities in order?

This gospel reminds us that our quest is to be great in the eyes of God. God loves those who love him back and love his people. God calls us to be humble of heart, hungry for his Word, and rich in faith.

Everyday Stewardship

When I was a child, I often thought of the Church as something mystical and supernatural. I wasn't wrong in my understanding of the Body of Christ, for surely

the Church has these characteristics. However, even though we speak about the foundation of all we are as Church being the "mystery of Christ," Jesus became a man so that supernatural element could break into the natural world in a profound way. What we once could not see, we now see. What we saw as a God in a distant place now dwelt among us. It is one of the aspects of Catholicism that I have grown to appreciate the most as I have matured: for a Catholic, the supernatural is natural. The communion of saints is heavenly and earthly at the same time.

The Beatitudes instruct us about this reality. Pope Francis reminds us holiness is "not about swooning in mystic rapture." Holiness is about living in the real world and doing extraordinary things with our ordinary lives. Our stewardship way of life consists of actions in the natural world that have extraordinary repercussions.

Do not ever take your simple actions of generosity and love for granted. As disciples called to a life of stewardship, we participate in something more profound than what we can see. We are blessed to be called to follow Jesus, and we bring blessing to all those with whom we choose to share ourselves. — *Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS* ©LPi

President's Day—On the third Monday in February, we honor our first President, George Washington, whose birthday is February 22. We also traditionally honor President Abraham Lincoln, whose birthday is February12. Washington's birthday was the first federal holiday to honor an individual's birth date. In 1885, Congress designated February 22, as a holiday for all federal workers. Nearly a century later, in 1971, the Uniform Monday Holiday Law changed the date to the third Monday in February. The position of the holiday between the two birthdays gave rise to the popular name of Presidents Day.

Other fun facts:

- John Tyler fathered 15 children, more than any other president. He also has two living grandchildren as of 2024.
- Harry S. Truman never earned a college degree. He was the last president of the United States to not have one.
- James Madison was the shortest president, standing 5'-4" and weighing just over 100 pounds.
- John Quincy Adams stated keeping a journal in 1779. By the time he passed in 1848, there was 50 volumes. These writing have offered historians firsthand account of the formation of the United States. *Excerpts from archives.gov and leavett.com*

The Anointing of the Sick is offered at regular intervals in the parish and at area nursing homes.

Baptism Classes— Baptism class is required before a first Baptism. Parents expecting their first child should attend. For questions contact the church office.

The Wedding Policy of the Diocese of St. Cloud

requires that you contact the parish at least 6 months prior to your wedding. This is necessary so that all the required steps can be completed in a timely manner. For second marriages, more time may be required. To begin your marriage preparation or for questions about the marriage preparation policy, contact Father Joe (634-3813).
