

WEEDING OUR GARDENS

Lent is going by fast. As typical of the weather, there was snow the week of the high school hockey finals and also the girl's basketball week. I would not be surprised if we have one more snowstorm.

I recently put out some information on how our ACC (Area Catholic Communities) operates. New information from the diocese suggests more changes. The diocese wants us to have a single Parish Life (Pastoral Council) Committee among the three parishes. We have already been moving in that direction.

Beginning with our April meeting (we meet quarterly) the individual councils will meet together. We have also formed a Planning Committee which will meet at various times to develop a plan to present to the Bishop sometime in 2026.

The basic premise of the ACC is the diocese wants us to operate as ONE parish with three worship sites.

A theme of Lent as given in the Story of the Prodigal Son was that God the Father continues to call us back into a right relationship. He is willing to forgive us regardless of our faults. No sin us unforgivable. God forgives us of both minor and major sins.

In our personal lives we are called to weed out any bad behavior and plant acts of goodness. How can we "pay if forward" or give alms to the poor, the hungry, and the homeless? As a parish we support the Pope County Food Shelf among other charities.

At the end of Lent, on Good Friday, you are encouraged to return your Rice Bowls, whether coins or a check. These funds are distributed by the Catholic Relief Service to places throughout the world.

There will be additional opportunities on Tuesdays after Masses at St. Bartholomew and St. John Nepomuk.





Stoking the Lenten Fire

I think we all can acknowledge that there's a certain fatigue that comes over us all as we near the end of the Lenten

season. Next week is Laetare Sunday, and I find that as soon as those pink vestments start coming out of storage, our collective motivation begins to wane.

I get that. Maybe you're fatigued — I am, too. Maybe you're doing well in your resolutions and devotions but you're in danger of coasting. Or maybe, like many of us this year or in past years, you don't feel that you have even really begun your Lenten journey.

Either way, chances are that the fire that was in your belly on Ash Wednesday is burning a bit low. All fires eventually do, once they consume whatever fuels them. So here we would do well to remember what fuels our Lenten fire.

Sometimes we make resolutions which have the appearance of being spiritual, but also have an earthly motive. We give up chocolate hoping to lose weight. We stop gossiping so our friends may like us more. There is nothing wrong with these sacrifices — just with their motivations.

As Moses removes his sandals to approach the burning bush, he sees that the fire burns brightly, strongly — but does not consume. It is propelled by something inexhaustible, something which is not of this world.

Is your Lenten fire fueled by God? Are you daily surrendering yourself to the same voice that boomed from the bush in Genesis — the voice that commanded the Israelites to do what seemed like the impossible?

hospital. Due to privacy laws, hospitals are not allowed to give out patient's names, making it challenging to know who would like a visit.

Anointing of the Sick is available on request. If you or a family member wish to be anointed before surgery, when in the hospital, or for any sickness, please contact Fr. Joe. He can be reached by calling the parish office at 634-3813, and if necessary, by leaving a message on Extension 20.



The Anointing of the Sick is offered at regular intervals in the parish and at area nursing homes.

Eucharist for the homebound—If you are homebound and wish to receive Communion at home, call the church office at 634-3813.





Baptism Classes— Baptism class is required before a first Baptism. Parents expecting their first child should attend. For questions contact the church office.

The Wedding Policy of the Diocese of St. Cloud

requires that you contact the parish at least 6 months prior to your wedding. This is necessary so that all the required steps can be completed in a timely manner. For second marriages, more time may be required. To begin your marriage preparation or for questions about the marriage preparation policy, contact Father Joe (634-3813).
