

COMING TOGETHER AS ONE

The Diocese of St. Cloud has begun a year long series of meetings to shape the future of our Area Catholic Community (ACC). Our ACC, Saints by the Lake, consists of Sacred Heart, St. Bartholomew and St. John Nepomuk. An initial meeting was held at Our Lady of the Runestone Church in Kennsington, which included all of the ACCs from the Southwest Deanery.

The diocese wants us the have a single Parish Life Committee (Parish Council) among the three parishes. We have already been moving in that direction. The ACC Parish Life Committee will meet quarterly, in the months of January, April, July and October. Present members of the Parish Life Committee will serve on the committee until their regular terms are complete. New members will be added in January each year.

The basic premise of the ACC is the diocese wants us to operate as ONE parish. Bishop Neary says we have too many corporations (each church is its own corporation) and buildings.

Look for regular updates in the bulletin, the website, and on Facebook. The Guiding Principles of the "All Things New" are Missionary Discipleship, Sacramental Life, Engaging the Laity, Listening as a Way of Being Church, and Prudent Stewardship.

Make the most of the last half of Lent. If you have not already done so, consider making an annual confession, choose a personal sacrifice, or add coins to your Rice Bowl. Take your family to a fish fry or enjoy a fish meal at your favorite restaurant.

The Half time of Lent

It's the fourth Sunday in Lent...and it is known as Laetare Sunday. Tradition-

ally, this Sunday has been a celebration within the Lenten season. Why the celebration? The Church realized the need for people to have a break during the season of Lent. (Remember the third Sunday in Advent?) The point of the day is to provide you with encouragement as you progress toward the end of the penitential season and Easter.

The day gets its name from the first few words of the traditional Latin entrance for the Mass of the day. "Laetare Jerusalem" from Isaiah 66:10. Laetare is Latin and means "to rejoice". The passage from Isaiah continues, "Rejoice with joy, you that have been in sorrow."

You will recall that during Lent we do not sing any songs with the word alleluia in them, and also there is no organ or extra instruments, just piano. On this Sunday, it is permissible to play the organ. And our songs may include phrases such as "Glory and Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ," which are more penitent.

This Sunday is also known as Mothering Sunday, Refreshment Sunday, and Rose Sunday. Historically the day was also known as "the Sunday of the Five Loaves," from the story of the miracle of the loaves and fishes. The Rose Sunday name comes from the rose-colored vestments worn on this day, or the Golden Rose sent by the Popes of the Catholic sovereigns to be blessed at this time. Or Mothering Sunday, as servants were released from service for the day to visit their mothers.

Laetare Sunday notes that Easter is in sight— exactly 21 days away.

The Wedding Policy of the Diocese of St. Cloud

requires that you contact the parish at least 6 months prior to your wedding. This is necessary so that all the required steps can be completed in a timely manner. For second marriages, more time may be required. To begin your marriage preparation or for questions about the marriage preparation policy, contact Father Joe (634-3813).
