

WELCOMING OUR NEIGHBORS

On Sunday, March 2, I celebrated by 67th birthday. This is a significant number because I am coming closer to the retirement age of 70. As our diocese continues with its planning process we can expect to see changes. I do not anticipate any major changes in our ACC. However, the reality is that as the number of priests decline, we will see new configurations of parishes, and sadly the closing of some parishes.

The bishop mentioned in his column that we have 14 men in formation for priesthood and 19 men in formation to become deacons. This seems problematic as there should be a balance between the numbers of priests and deacons.

I do not know what kind of changes the Planning Office is envisioning. For the present we will maintain our weekend schedule. To help ease the work, we discourage Saturday funerals, and also encourage Friday weddings. The good news is that our weekend Masses are generally 2/3 or more full. It is good to see so many families with children attending worship.

As I read this Sunday's first reading from Deuteronomy, I reflected on the difficulties experienced by the people of Gaza. Their properties have been mostly destroyed along with their economy. The greater tragedy is that they are bordered by Muslim countries who could easily accommodate 2 million people. Egypt will not even allow them temporary asylum.

Moses reflected on his own nation which went down to Egypt where they became numerous, but they were poorly treated and abused. The Lord heard their cries and brought them out of Egypt into a place of freedom, a land flowing with milk and honey. To this day, the Jews are treated poorly by non-Jews. In these circumstances they share a common reality with the Palestinians.

There was a very small number of Christians living in Gaza. We do not know whether they have survived or been killed in the violence. We pray all the Israeli hostages, both living and dead, may be returned to their families, and the residents of Gaza may begin to rebuild their lives.

Religious Education Notes




On March 12, 1912, a lady named Juliette Low invited some young girls to come to her house for a tea party. That afternoon she showed them pictures of a girl's club in Eng-

Everyday Stewardship

Filling the Basket This Lent

Lent calls us into deeper everyday stewardship because it beautifully creates opportunities to be mindful of the call of

Christ in even the most mundane moments of our day.

Many of us will participate in the time-honored tradition of doing penance, or "giving something up" for Lent. When we do this, we are mimicking the Israelites who filled their baskets with the first fruits of their harvest, "and having set them before the Lord, your God, (bowing) down in his presence" (Deuteronomy 26:10).

What are we going to bring before the Lord this Lent? What are our first fruits?

If you're struggling with ideas for how to "fill your basket," it can help to come at the problem from the opposite side. Take a look at the six characteristics of Everyday Stewardship and think about the moments in your day when you fail to fulfill the virtues to which they are calling you.

- What is keeping you from being mindful of the call of Christ throughout your day? I promise you, if you listen, you'll hear it more than once.
- What is keeping you from being prayerful? When you have set your first fruits before the Lord, what keeps you from bowing down in His presence to finish the offering?
- What keeps you from being grateful especially of the small things that so often go unnoticed?
- What keeps you from being gracious, from leaving people smiling as they walk away?
- What keeps you from being committed and accountable? Where do your excuses come from and what makes you indulge them? — *Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS* ©LPi

hospital. Due to privacy laws, hospitals are not allowed to give out patient's names, making it challenging to know who would like a visit.

Anointing of the Sick is available on request. If you or a family member wish to be anointed before surgery, when in the hospital, or for any sickness, please contact Fr. Joe. He can be reached by calling the parish office at 634-3813, and if necessary, by leaving a message on Extension 20.



The Anointing of the Sick is offered at regular intervals in the parish and at area nursing homes.

Eucharist for the homebound—If you are homebound and wish to receive Communion at home, call the church office at 634-3813.





Baptism Classes— Baptism class is required before a first Baptism. Parents expecting their first child should attend. For questions contact the church office.

The Wedding Policy of the Diocese of St. Cloud

requires that you contact the parish at least 6 months prior to your wedding. This is necessary so that all the required steps can be completed in a timely manner. For second marriages, more time may be required. To begin your marriage preparation or for questions about the marriage preparation policy, contact Father Joe (634-3813).
